

## COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL CARE COMMITTEE POLICY STATEMENT

The Atchison County Fair is the showplace for animal agriculture for the county. All animals and livestock shown, housed, or displayed shall receive care that is humane, healthful, and consistent with accepted practices. Cruelty, neglect, or indifference to animal comfort will not be tolerated and will constitute grounds for removal from the premises. Animal care shall be consistent with sound husbandry practices and with rules and regulations set by the Atchison County Fair Board.

Professional veterinary care will be provided as needed. Animals experiencing illness, injury, or discomfort will be professionally attended to only by a licensed veterinarian. Exhibits shall reflect the care and concern that Missourians have for livestock, poultry, companion animals, and wildlife.

### Liability Statement

The Atchison County Fair will not be responsible to any person, individual, corporation or association for any loss by fire, theft, damage, or personal injury sustained by anyone through the negligence of any person or group of persons, exhibits or exhibitors.

### GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The 2008 Missouri State Fair livestock rules will be followed, with the following exceptions:
2. Exhibitor must be officially enrolled in a 4-H program or FFA Chapter.
3. Ownership deadlines: breeding beef, 6/1; market beef, 3/15; breeding gilts, 90 days; market hogs, 5/15; breeding sheep, 7/1; market lambs, 6/15; breeding does, 6/15; market goats, 6/15.
4. **All exhibitors will pay a \$5 entry fee per head.**
5. Exhibitors must bring their own feed, bedding, water buckets, and pans. **Exhibitors WILL NOT be paid premiums if stalls are not cleaned. This includes stalls outside of the barn as well as within the barn. Premium checks will not be issued until the Fair Board receives a handwritten thank-you note from the exhibitors to their award sponsors.**
6. Exhibitors must wear the official show t-shirt provided by the Fair Board during the shows and auction.
7. For the youth show, grooming may be done only by exhibitors and immediate members of any exhibitor's family, other exhibitors, and/or 4-H Project Leaders and FFA Advisors.
8. An exhibitor may have a maximum of two (2) entries per class. Up to three (3) market livestock are allowed for ultrasound (up to three per market specie—beef, hogs, lambs).
9. Uncontrollable animals may be dismissed from the show ring by the superintendent or the fair board president.
10. All livestock classified by Danish System: Blue, Red, and White.
11. Any grievance must be voiced before the end of the show to the show superintendent and Fair Board president.
12. The livestock show will follow the animal health requirements for the 2009 Missouri State Fair (visit [www.mostatefair.com](http://www.mostatefair.com) for requirements).

### ATCHISON COUNTY MARKET LIVESTOCK RULES

13. **Weigh-day is optional, but market animals must be weighed at weigh-day to be eligible for the rate-of-gain contest, beef profitability contest, and in-county champion.**
14. All animals that sell at auction must show.
15. **Once an animal is nominated for auction, that animal must remain in sale order.**
16. The Atchison County Fair Board will make arrangements for animals to be delivered to sale barn or packing plant. Transportation costs will be deducted from premium check.
17. Buyers will bid the premium on dollars per animal starting from \$0. Buyers pay premium bid the day of the sale.
18. There will be an \$8.00 deduction per animal sold at auction from the exhibitor's premium to pay for pictures and the Appreciation Dinner for buyers. There will be an additional deduction

for ultrasound data for beef calves, hogs, and lambs, and a deduction for carcass data on steers and heifers, based on fees charged by the data providers.

19. An exhibitor may **sell a maximum of TWO (2) market animals in the auction.**
20. The sale order will be set up to allow all exhibitors to sell one (1) animal before an exhibitor's second animal is sold.

**MARKET LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP GUIDELINES**

1. The exhibitor must show his/her own animal during the showmanship class.
2. Prizes will be awarded for Champion Showmanship in each of the three showmanship classes: 11 yrs and under, 12-14 yrs, and 15 yrs and older. Age is as of January 1, year of show.

### MARKET BEEF RULES:

1. Steers and heifers will show by weight classes, regardless of breed, with a minimum of six and a maximum of ten steers or heifers per class with the exception of home raised classes, determined by superintendent.
2. Home raised beef animals must have been owned by parent, grandparent, or member at time of birth.
3. **Atchison County exhibitors participating in the beef profitability contest: Each exhibitor must have read, understood, and signed disclosure statements indicating that they did not feed FDA-prohibited proteins to their market beef animals and that all drugs administered to the animal were legal and used according to label directions. All market beef animals from the county will be refused at the packing plant if disclosure statements are not signed.**

**BEEF CARCASS SHOW**

1. Carcass data will be collected by ultrasound for exhibitors who choose to participate.
2. Up to 10 steer carcasses will be ranked with the minimum qualifications of 500 to 950 lbs hot carcass weight, low choice quality grade or better, yield grade (YG) of 3.99 or less with no price discounts. After meeting the criteria, carcasses will be ranked on percent (%) cutability.

**BEEF PROFITABILITY CONTEST**

1. All market beef animals sent to be harvested at Tyson Fresh Meats, Dennison, IA, will participate in the beef profitability contest.
2. Animals will be ranked on retail value per day on feed. Retail value per day on feed = [(Hot carcass weight, lbs. - (0.55 x start weight, lbs.)) x % retail product x (carcass price, \$ per lb/0.64)]/days on feed.
3. Illegal drug residues found in carcasses will be the responsibility of the exhibitor, not the Fair Board.

**BEEF YIELD AND QUALITY GRADE CONTEST**

1. **Contest is mandatory for Atchison County market beef exhibitors.**
2. Five (5) market steers will be selected on Wednesday afternoon by the Market Beef Superintendent and the Extension Livestock Specialist to be evaluated in the contest.
3. 4-H and FFA exhibitors will be divided into three age groups; 15 yrs. of age and older, 12 to 14 yrs., and 11 yrs. of age and younger. There will also be an adult division.
4. Participants will be ranked on how accurately they estimated USDA yield and quality grades for the live animals. Official yield and quality grades will be collected at the time of harvest at the packing plant. Ties will be broken with hot carcass weight estimates.

1. Each exhibitor will be allowed to weigh in a maximum of 25 pigs for the gain contest.
2. Hogs must be registered in classes immediately after weigh-in at the fair.
3. Market classes will be divided by weight. Pen classes will be determined by total weight of group.
4. An exhibitor may have one (1) pen-of-three market hogs total. Two of the three hogs must have shown in individual classes.
5. Breeding gilts are not eligible for the market hog show.
6. Exhibitors shipping hogs to packing plant must present their SMQA or PQA+ card at weigh-in at the fair.

HOME ARTS

**GENERAL RULES**

1. Exhibits must be this year's projects, completed since September 2008.
2. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor.
3. There will be a limit of 2 exhibits per individual per class.
4. Exhibits must have an entry tag. These may be picked up at the University of Missouri Extension Center, 201 East Hwy 136, Rock Port, before the Fair.
5. Any exhibits with no class number will not be judged and therefore will receive no ribbon or prize money.
6. All articles will be judged in the class entered.

7. All articles will be under the supervision of the superintendents and care will be taken to prevent loss and damage. The Atchison County Fair Board will not be responsible for damage or loss.
8. All exhibits must be entered on **(day and time here)** at the Velma Houts Fair Building, 201 East Hwy 136, Rock Port. Items brought in after this time will not be accepted.
9. The exhibit area will be closed for judging on Wednesday, July 15, from 10:30 a.m.-12:00 p.m.
10. See Fair schedule for viewing times.
11. All exhibits will be released on Saturday, July 18, at 4:00 p.m. No exhibits will be released prior to this time.
12. Ribbons will be awarded to the top three exhibits in each class: one first place - blue, one second place - red, one third place - white. All other exhibits in a class will be awarded a participation ribbon.
13. Premium money will be awarded to the top three exhibits in each class of all divisions that are judged. (Blue - \$8.00; Red - \$6.00; White - \$4.00)
14. Rosettes will be awarded to three outstanding exhibits in each section of those Divisions judged. These will be selected from the blue ribbon exhibits in each section.
15. Prize money can be collected when exhibits are released. All prize money not collected at this time will be forfeited to the Atchison County Fair.
16. 4-Hers may enter items (not the same item) in the 4-H Department and the Youth Division and the Open Division of the Home Arts Department.
17. Exhibitors eligible for the Senior Division must have turned 60 by July 1, year of show.

2. No item may be prepared from a mix, except for Class 7.

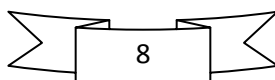

Food Preservation

1. Only standard pints or quarts may be used except that a standard one-half pint jelly jar may be used for jam, jellies or preserves.
2. Preserved food will not be opened.
3. An exhibit is one jar of canned food.
4. All jars must be labeled as to contents and date of processing. A recipe on a 3x5 card must accompany the entry to determine method (water-bath vs. pressure) of canning. Fruits and pickle products must be processed using a boiling water bath. Vegetables, meat and poultry must be pressure-canned, and jelly products must be processed in a simmering or boiling water bath. Note: The method of canning also indicates the use of appropriate canning equipment.
5. Because there is no substitute for a safe recipe or correct processing, the following entries will be disqualified:
  - a. paraffin sealed sweet spreads
  - b. jars with zinc lids
  - c. foods in green glass jars or non-standard jars
  - d. jars without a vacuum seal
  - e. foods that have been improperly processed or packed
  - f. jars with more than 2<sup>2</sup> headspace

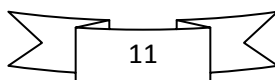

## DEPARTMENT H – HORTICULTURE

### Rules

1. Division I is for adults, Division II is for youth age 5-18.
2. Each entry must have a label showing department, division, class number, cultivar/variety name, and name of exhibitor.
3. Exhibitors may have more than one entry per class in Sections A-D only when the entries are different in variety, cultivar or color (e.g. red onions and white onions, red rose and white rose, or in named varieties, a different name). Exhibitors may have only one entry per class in the Design section.
4. If more than one item is required for vegetable or fruit display, items must be placed on a paper plate or foil pan. Exhibitors should provide their own containers for cut flowers (clear glass).
5. All exhibits in Sections A-D must be grown by the exhibitor except for potted plants, which should have been in their possession for at least six weeks before the fair. (This does not pertain to plant material used in designs. All designs must have been made by the exhibitor.)
6. No artificial plant material may be added to any design or any horticulture exhibit. Flags and religious symbols may not be used in any design.
7. A background may be used for designs but must be furnished by exhibitor. Accessories may also be used but are subordinate to the plant material and within the dimensions for the design.
8. The committee or helpers are not responsible for any breakage or loss.
9. For more information about exhibiting vegetables, contact the Extension Center and ask for Guide Sheet 6230 "Exhibiting and Judging Garden Vegetables."
10. Any exhibits not picked up at checkout time will be forfeited. Premium monies will also be forfeited. (Exhibitor may arrange for someone else to pick up.)
11. Awards (Ribbons): One blue (1<sup>st</sup>), one red (2<sup>nd</sup>) and one white (3<sup>rd</sup>) ribbon may be awarded in each class. One blue, one red, and one white rosette may be awarded in each section as selected from the blue ribbon winners. However, if the number of entries is not sufficient in any section, then only the blue rosette may be awarded.
